Lee County's Cape Coral was founded in 1957 and developed as a planned community. The city's population in 2016 was 179,804. And approximately 183,365 in 2019 with an area of 120 square miles, with elevation above sea level of 6ft 7in. Cape Coral is the largest city between Tampa and Miami. It is a principal city in the Cape Coral-Fort Myers, FL metropolitan area and is known as a "Waterfront Wonderland."

Cape Coral is a bedroom community in Southwest Florida, known for its many canals. The Yacht Club Community Park has a large beach and pier on the Caloosahatchee River. To the north, For Mile Ecological Preserve attracts herons, ibis and more.
